

If you were out and about on April 25, perhaps you were intrigued by an inspiring Earth Day sight: GMU students and staff wearing matching T-shirts and wielding lawn and garden tools, dedicating their energy to benefit their shared communities. Thus began a grand experiment in citizenship and service.

The day commenced with a picnic lunch at Copes Corners, complete with T-shirt distribution, division into teams, and a group picture. Next, buses delivered teams both north and south to work on a variety of projects, including tree-trimming and removal, garden prep, stone-picking, wood-stacking, painting, and general debris management. One team learned about and helped to create a meditation labyrinth, while others got to beautify a Zen garden. Teams who spruced up Copes Corners inspired a letter from the Butternuts Town Board expressing sincere gratitude: "Students descended on the leaf piles 'like a swarm of locusts' and made quick work of them. For that we are very grateful. The school was well represented by the students." No matter the assigned duties, participants came away from the experience knowing a bit more about the myriad physical demands of the beautiful environs surrounding us each day. And equally important, the character of GMU students shone.

An especially meaningful aspect of the day occurred after the manual labor was completed, with teams and adult leaders gathering in the GMU auditorium for sharing of pictures, stories, and reactions. Feedback from students and staff was universally positive, with many making mention of the good vibes enjoyed as a by-product of helping others. Echoing the grateful comments of appreciative residents, staff members reported being inspired by the cooperative and energetic spirit that prevailed, and everyone agreed that community clean-up day should be, at the very least, an annual event.

So, as Earth Day approaches next year, keep in mind the willing hearts and hands of GMU teens eager to lighten the drudgery of cleaning up after our northern winters. Sincere thanks to students, school, and community for all the support and planning that made this first day of giving a success. National Honor Society Inductions



Technology Education At GMU

The technology program at GMU offers students the opportunity to combine ideas and knowledge with hands-on skill application. Students are required to learn material, convey ideas through drawings and other forms of communication, and use skills to develop and construct projects that are viewed in both aesthetic and functional modes. This year, students have been challenged by different problems presented to them. Most students discover working solutions to these problems. However, there is a learning curve for others. Some students find their solutions to be inadequate. Overcoming frustrations is another aspect of Technology Education. Learning from mistakes, and redeveloping ideas

are as essential to the learning process as getting it right the first time around. Maintaining a respected level of effort is emphasized heavily in all Technology Education classes.

The DDP/(Design and Drawing For Production) class combines both technical drawing and engineering skills. In addition to drawing and learning AutoCAD for college credit, students are required to take their ideas to the machine world. Students developed and produced hardwood cutting boards, working hydraulic machines, earthquake simulation towers, and crossbow styled catapults to test and develop their engineering skills.

The seventh grade Technology classes indulged in a wide variety of learning experiences and challenges. Students developed skills in areas of electronics, circuit board construction, woodworking, manufacturing, invention research, combining writing skills with technical ideas, transportation technologies, CO2 powered vehicles, design development, technical drawing, development of designs to working prototypes, future technologies, understanding electric motors, electromagnetism, magnetic levitation vehicles, and other technical concepts.

Several students participated in the Furniture Design course. Daniel Backman produced an Arts and Crafts style coffee table. Jessica Conklin engineered a dining room table. Dylan Raymond constructed a gun cabinet. Colin Schultes built a cabinet and Zachary Hilgers also produced a gun cabinet.

Elementary Counselor Corner

It is hard to believe that we have made it to the end of another busy school year. I am proud when I look back on all that we have accomplished this year. I truly am lucky to be a part of the GMU family.

During the months of May and June I have completed my personal safety lessons in grades K-6. I cannot stress enough how important it is that parents speak with their children about personal safety. Personal safety means taking care of your body and protecting it. We all wear seatbelts and bicycle helmets, but personal safety is more than that. Children need to understand that they have the right to refuse any unwanted touch, even if it's from a trusted family member or close friend.

Children must understand that they can say no, get away, and should talk to a grown up about a touch that bothers them. Parents should choose opportunities or *teachable* moments to reinforce safety skills. If an incident occurs in your community and your child asks you about it, speak frankly but with reassurance. Explain to your children that you want to discuss the safety rules with them, so that they will know what to do if they are ever confronted with a difficult situation. Make sure you have *safety nets* in place, so that your child knows there is always someone who can help them. I strongly encourage parents/guardians to discuss personal safety with their children. Here are some key points to go over with your child.

- Always check first with a parent, guardian, or trusted adult before going anywhere, accepting anything, or getting into a car with anyone.
- Do not go out alone. Always take a friend with when going places or playing outside.

- Say no if someone tries to touch you, or treats you in a
 way that makes you feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused. Get out of the situation as quickly as possible.
- Tell a parent, guardian, or trusted adult if you feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused.

What should a parent know when talking to a child about safety?

- Don't forget your older children. Children aged 11 to17
 are equally at risk for victimization. At the same time
 you are giving your older children more freedom, make
 sure they understand important safety rules as well.
- Speak to your children in manner that is calm and nonthreatening. Children do not need to be frightened to get the point across. In fact, fear can thwart the safety message, because fear can be paralyzing to a child.
- Speak openly. Children will be less likely to come to you about issues enshrouded in secrecy. If they feel that you are comfortable discussing the subject at hand, they may be more forthcoming.
- Teach your children that safety is more important than manners. In other words, it is more important for children to get themselves out of a threatening situation than it is to be polite. They also need to know that it is okay to tell you what happened, and they won't be tattletales.

All of my counseling groups and individual counseling sessions have come to a close. I had so much fun working with all of my students this year and watching them grow. I am looking forward to next year already! I have a lot of fun and exciting things planned!

Memo from the Health Office

Answers to Questions for those who Suffer from Asthma/Allergies

(Taken from *Fresh AAIR* from the Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America)

Written by Dr. Douglas Johnston, a Board Certified Allergist/Immunologist.

Question: Can peanuts and/or tree nuts cause inflammation?

Answer: In patients with peanut and/or tree nut allergy, allergic inflammation can occur. This is due to the development of specific IgE antibodies against peanut which lead to histamine release which can cause several different symptoms immediately after ingestion including hives, swelling, wheezing, cough, shortness of breath, nausea, vomiting and at times low blood pressure. The treatment for food allergy is avoidance, and epinephrine if symptoms occur after ingestion.

Question: I have pollen, dust and animal allergies. Would double pane windows help or hurt?

Answer: If the windows are shut there would likely be little difference between single and double pane windows. Double pane windows may provide better insulation, however, I often recommend that patients keep the window shut during pollen season in an effort to reduce the amount of pollen that gets into the bedroom. Other recommendations such as removing animals from the bedroom, zipper encasements of mattress and pillows, reducing humidity in the bedroom to under 50%, and frequent vacuuming are helpful for animal and house dust mite allergies.

Question: My 4-year-old son has a persistent cough in the winter that keeps him up at night. OTC medications for cough suppressant do not seem to help. Can you have asthma even if you do not wheeze? He has seasonal allergies but the cough seems worse than just allergies.

Answer: Yes, you can have asthma even if you do not wheeze. This is called *cough variant asthma* and is treated the same as traditional asthma. I would discuss his symptoms with your doctor. If the cough responds to albuterol, it would strongly support a diagnosis of asthma.

Question: My children were just diagnosed with peanut and tree nut allergies. I have now started reading labels and found that some labels say that the product was made in a facility that produces peanuts and tree nuts. Is that food safe for my kids to eat?

Answer: Most allergists would recommend avoidance of foods that "may contain *allergen*" or were "made in a facility that produces *allergen*."

Hope this information is helpful.

Its Spring—Time to Prevent Lyme Disease

(Info from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention)
As we start spending more time outdoors during spring
and into summer, we have to be aware of the risk of tick bites.
Gardening, camping, hiking, and just playing outdoors are
all great spring and summertime activities, but make tick
protection part of your outdoor plans as well.

Fortunately there are several tactics you and your family can use to prevent tick bites and reduce your risk of tickborne disease.

Know where to expect ticks. Blacklegged ticks live in moist and humid environments, particularly in or near wooded or grassy areas. You may come into contact with ticks during outdoor activities around your home or when walking through vegetation such as leaf litter or shrubs. To avoid ticks, walk in the center of trails.

Use a repellent with DEET (on skin or clothing) or permethrin (on clothing) and wear long sleeves, long pants and socks. Products containing permethrin can be used to treat boots, clothing and camping gear which can remain protective through several washings. Repellents containing 20% or more DEET (N, N-diethyl-m-tolumide) can be applied to the skin, and they can protect up to several hours. Always follow product instructions! Parents should apply this product to their children, taking care to avoid application to hands, eyes and mouth.

It may sound silly, but tuck your pant legs into your socks so that ticks cannot crawl up inside of your pant legs. Some ticks can crawl down into shoes and are small enough to crawl through most socks.

Hope this is helpful to you.

New Sunscreen Regulations

The following information has been received from the The State Education Department of New York in Albany:

"Effective immediately, schools are no longer required to obtain a medical provider order to allow a student to carry and use sunscreen in school if:

- The sunscreen is used for the purpose of avoiding overexposure to the sun and not for medical treatment of an injury or illness;
- The sunscreen is approved by the FDA for over-thecounter use; and
- The student's parent or guardian provides written permission for the student to carry and use sunscreen.

A student who is unable to physically apply sunscreen may be assisted by unlicensed personnel when directed to do so by the student, if permitted by a parent or guardian and authorized by the school.

Parents/guardians are responsible for providing the sunscreen they would like their child to use at school."
