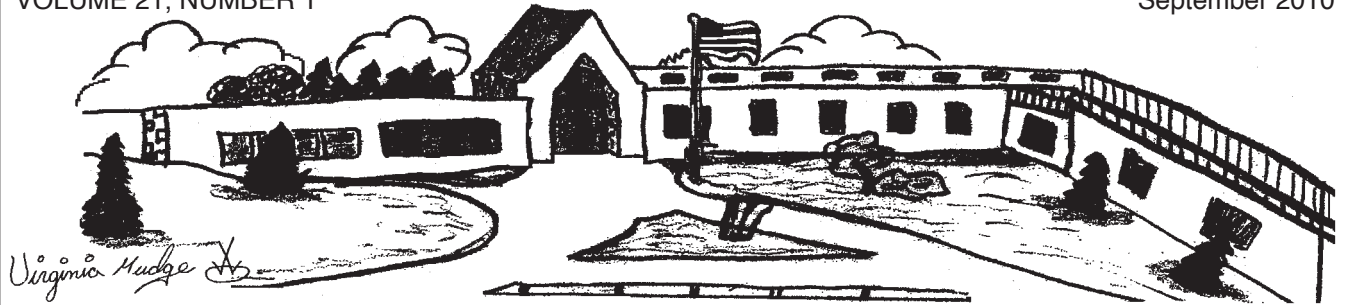

## Building Updates

Summer is back, the weather is great, and the building project is in high gear. Construction continues to run smoothly. The three additions to the building are complete, with only two areas left to complete renovations in the school and a small amount of work left in the Transportation Center.

The Elementary Library was completed in June with an update to the lighting, this includes new, larger circular lights and four new hanging pendant light fixtures. These are a very attractive new accent to that area. The High School Library will be expanding into the neighboring classroom adding over 700 square feet to the area. The updated library will also be outfitted with new, larger circular lights and the hanging pendant light fixtures, as well as new carpet and a new book case layout that will allow for more study space.

The locker room area is going through a very extensive renovation. The existing coach's offices have been removed and smaller storage rooms are being built in their place, this will make the hallway much wider to allow for more traffic. The old weight room has received new plumbing for showers and bathrooms. The space has been divided into two new offices for the GMU Raider's coaches. Locker room showers are receiving an overhaul; showers will be taken down and reinstalled on the outside wall. They will then receive individual partitions to allow privacy.

There is also an extensive blacktop resurfacing project taking place. This will resurface most of the old blacktop on the grounds.

We hope that everyone is enjoying their summer while looking forward to seeing the finished product when you return in September.

### At their regular meeting June 15, the Board:

- Heard the Superintendent and members provide the following Positive Highlights :
  - High School and Middle School Award Ceremonies, Sports Desert and Awards were well attended and supported by the community.
  - Many field trips, athletic team trips and class trips, including one each to New York City and Boston were completed in a safe and timely manner.
  - Inspired by excellent support from the community, our musicians *cleaned up* at the Sherburne Band Pageant winning firsts in Small Ensemble, Jazz Band, Drum Line and Class B.
  - Twenty third to fifth grade girls participated in *Girls on the Run*, culminating in a 5K non-competitive race in Cooperstown.

## Back to School Reminders

With September comes the beginning of a new school year, new goals and challenges, new friends and the renewal of old friendships. How exciting all of it can be! All students received their teacher assignment on their report card prior to the summer with a letter and supply list from their teacher. Parents should have received a letter from me about the start of a new school year, as well as a listing of all the elementary classroom teachers.

On the first day of school, your child will be bringing home a Student Information Form and the Student/Parent Handbook. Please read through the handbook with your child(ren), complete the forms and return them to the office by September 10.

**Bus note reminder:** Any changes to your child's bussing must come in as a written note or fax by 1:30 p.m. We will not accept any changes by phone or after 1:30 p.m. Bus notes should include: the child(ren)'s name, regular bus number (or animal), the name of the person whose house they are going to and that bus number or animal. If you are unaware of the bus number, please call Joe Zaczek at the bus garage at 783-2207, ext. 115. Please be sure to give the name of the person and not "Grandma Betty's" or "Aunt Jane's".

The teachers, support staff and I look forward to working closely with you throughout the year. Together, we will share the rewarding venture of providing your child(ren) with a quality and exciting educational program. I hope your child enjoys the upcoming school year and meets with a great deal of success!

**TIPS:** Start the school year off right—Set up a quiet time and place for your child to do homework, get a routine set up that includes asking your child about their school day, look at their agenda/homework folder/Friday folder for homework assignments and notes from the teacher, if you have questions, don't wait, call the teacher.

Kindergarten and new to the District parents—ask questions like: Does my child get along with others? Does my child participate in group activities? ## Confidential Toll-Free Line

Troop C of the New York State Police reminds people of the creation of the toll-free line for the confidential reporting of potentially dangerous situations in the 16 school districts of the DCMO BOCES. This system, housed at Troop C Headquarters, is answered by a machine which is regularly checked by police officials.

This system is not designated for callers reporting an immediate threat; such calls should be reported to 911 or other appropriate emergency service providers. The phone number is available on posters placed in the school districts and also through school district publications.

## No Child Left Behind

Our Student Support Services Department, following the *No Child Left Behind Act of 2001*, continues to provide academic, remedial and social/emotional support to ALL students. This support is directly linked to our Academic Intervention Services and includes extra in-class help provided by teachers, assistants and aides, learning centers, after-school programs, scheduled AIS, counseling and intensive individualized instruction. In addition, Student Support Services provides special education and 504 interventions as needed and required.

As outlined in the *No Child Left Behind Act of 2001*, Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School is committed to providing our students with highly qualified educators. We appreciate and applaud initiatives aimed at recruiting and maintaining trained professionals and we continue to seek out the best teachers and support personnel to serve your children. If you are interested in learning more about our District's excellent staff, we welcome your inquiries. You may request the following information via the District Office about your

child's teacher and/or paraprofessional:

- Whether the teacher has met State qualifications and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction.
- Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which State qualifications or licensing criteria have been waived.
- The Baccalaureate Degree major of the teacher and any other graduate certification or degree held by the teacher, and the field or discipline of the certification or degree.
- Whether the child is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications.

## Track Star

**Taylor Nichols** is 13-years-old and has experienced a level of success in Track and Field that is rare for an athlete her age. Taylor is a member of the modified Track and Field program at Gilbertsville-Mount Upton. She balances a demanding and competitive horse show schedule, and top notch academics all while finding time to train for her running and jumping events. Experiencing success at the 400m and 200m disciplines, running 1:06.1 and 29.1, respectively, Taylor competed in post season competition at the Hershey Track and Field local meet in Rome, NY in May. She competed in the standing long jump, and the 100m and 200m dash and placed 1st in all three events. Winning these events qualified her for the Hershey Track and Field State finals, held in Herkimer on June 22. At this meet she battled 90 degree temperatures and the top sprinters in New York State for a 1st, 2nd, and 5th place finish in the 100m, 200m and the standing long jump, respectively. Taylor's 100m time of 13.75 in the 13-14 age bracket will potentially qualify her for the National Hershey Track and Field meet to be held in Hershey, PA.

## Memo From The Health Office

Illness absence for more than 3 days, MD NOTE is needed upon return. Call attendance clerk at 783-2207 to report absence and f/u with note. If child is ill, fever, vomiting/diarrhea, keep them home until symptom-free for 24 hours.

If student is injured or ill and cannot participate in gym, NOTE FROM MD STATING *NO GYM* is needed for specific amount of time. MD MUST ALSO WRITE CLEARANCE NOTE FOR RETURN TO GYM.

If child becomes ill during school hours, he/she is released by the School Nurse who will make the appropriate contact with the parent/guardian. Students may not use the pay phone to call a parent for release. The parent/guardian or emergency contact person must sign the student out at the front desk. Students cannot be released to anyone other than those listed on. The Student Information form. For students who drive themselves to school and become ill, at the discretion of the School Nurse, a parent/guardian will be contacted to obtain permission for this student to drive self home.

If injured in school or at a school-sponsored activity and medical treatment is necessary, contact the School Nurse immediately, submit claims to your own Health Insurance provider, then submit proof of payment of claim or denial to the Business Office. The school only covers the cost not covered by your own insurance.

## Memo From The Health Office

Many things influence a child's progress and success in school – one of the most important is their health. Children must be healthy to learn. Children with cavities are not healthy. Cavities are preventable, but they affect more children than any other chronic disease (as per California's Dental Health Association).

Baby teeth are very important, not just teeth that will fall out. Children need their teeth to eat properly, talk, smile and feel good about themselves. Children with cavities have difficulties in some or all of these areas. They may also have problems paying attention and learning at school. Tooth decay is an infection that does not heal and can be painful if left without treatment. If left untreated, adult teeth may be permanently damaged.

Here is important advice to help your child stay healthy:

- Visit dentist twice a year (or as suggested by your dentist)
- Choose healthy foods for the entire family
- Brush at least twice a day (use fluoride if suggested by MD)
- Limit soda and candy. These contain a lot of sugar which causes cavities and contribute to weight problems.

I hope this information is helpful to you in ensuring good dental health for your child/children.

## School Lunch Program Guidelines

- Adults are not allowed to run credit accounts. Money may be placed on account in advance. No credit will be extended to adults.
- A maximum of \$10 in charges will be allowed. When a student's account reaches the \$10 limit, parents will be notified and the student will be placed on a cash only basis until such time as the account is paid in full. Students must have money on their account to purchase snacks using their account. If a student owes charges they will be unable to purchase snacks.
- Parents are strongly encouraged to place money on the student's account in advance.
- Applications for free and reduced lunch must be computed annually.
- Parents are encouraged to use the free and reduced lunch program if they qualify.

## Temporary Assistance to Needy Families

If you receive food stamps or Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF), you may receive a letter in August from the NYS Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance that will simplify the process for your child or children to receive free meals or milk at school.

If you take or send the letter to Martha Dibbell or one of the schools your child/children attend, your children will receive free meals or milk without your having to complete an application.

You will receive only one letter. If you lose it, it will not be replaced. If you do not return the letter to the school, you must fill out the Free and Reduced Price Application in order for your children to get free meals or milk.

## Emergency Procedures

All school districts in the State of New York are required to comply with the Commissioner's Regulation 155.13 which requires written annual instructions to parents, students and staff regarding District emergency management plans. The complete plans are on file in each Principal's office and are available to parents, students and staff at any time.

The object of emergency planning is to anticipate problems in dealing with natural and man-made disasters. Depending on the kind of intensity of this disaster, the school may be required to carry out any of the following procedures:

- A. School Cancellation
- B. Evacuation
- C. Early Dismissal
- D. Sheltering

Sheltering and early dismissal or go home drills are held at least once a year. Parents will receive an advance announcement of these drills via a newsletter at least one week prior to the drill.

It is important to note that emergency procedures may be carried out without advance notice. Children may be coming home to either empty homes or locked doors. Parents must make contingency plans with their children to go to the home of a neighbor if the children require supervision. A note has been sent home to all elementary parents requiring a copy of this plan.

Emergency information will be broadcast over the following radio stations: WKXZ, WCDO, WDOS, WSKG, WZOZ, WHWK, WAAL and school closings will also be broadcast on WBNG-TV.

## From the School Meals Program

The GMU CSD School Meals Program offers breakfast and lunch daily to students providing them with the nutrition necessary for healthy growth of their minds and bodies.

The menu is published monthly in the school newsletter. The cost of breakfast is \$1.25 for students PreK-12, lunch is \$1.70 for PreK-6 and \$1.90 for students in grades 7-12. You may prepay for your child's meals by sending either cash or a check, payable to GMU School Lunch Fund, and the money will be placed in your child's account. The costs per week are as follows: Breakfast for PreK-12: \$6.25, lunch for grades PreK-6: \$8.50 and grades 7-12: \$9.50.

I would encourage you to file an application (included in this newsletter or available from school) for a free or reduced lunch. If your child qualifies for reduced meals, the cost is \$.25 for breakfast and \$.25 for lunch or \$1.25 per week per meal.

Snack and a la carte items are also at a price range of \$.50-\$1.00. You may wish to place additional money in your child's account for purchasing these items. Please fill out the form below to allow your child to charge items other than lunch to their account and return the form to Martha Dibbell, School Meals Coordinator. Students must have money on their accounts to be able to charge milk or snacks. Thank you for your continued support of our program. ## Consent to Release Free or Reduced Price Eligibility Information

School officials may release information that shows that my child/children are eligible for free or reduced price meals or free milk to the following programs. I understand that the information will only be provided to the program(s) checked.

Check the box next to the program area(s) you wish to release information to:

- Federal health programs such as Medicaid or Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).
- State or federal programs such as the Youth Summer Work program or the Educational Talent Search Program.
- Local health and education programs and other local programs that provide benefits such as free textbooks or school supplies, free band instruments, or reduced fees for summer school or driver education.
- Community programs such as holiday baskets, summer arts and playground programs.

I understand that I will be releasing information that will show that my child/children are eligible for free and reduced price meals or free milk for my child. I give up my right to confidentiality for the program(s) checked.

## Free and Reduced Price Meal Application Fact Sheet

When filling out the application form, please pay careful attention to these helpful hints.

### **Food Stamp/TANF/FDPIR case number:**

This must be the complete case number supplied to you by the agency including all numbers and letters, for example, E 123456, or whatever combination is used in your county. Refer to a letter you received from your local Department of Social Services for your case number or contact them for your number. All children with the same case number may be listed on the same application. Separate applications are required for children with different case numbers.

### **Direct Certification:**

If you receive food stamps or TANF, send in the Direct Certification Letter from the NYS Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance instead of completing the application.

### **Foster Child:**

A child who is living with a family but who is under the legal care of the welfare agency or court. List the child's *personal use* income. This includes only those funds provided by the agency which are identified for the personal use of the child, such as personal spending allowances, money received by his/her family, or from a job. Funds provided for housing, food and care, medical, and therapeutic needs are not considered income to the foster child. Write "0" if the child has no personal use income.

### **Household:**

A group of related or non-related people who are living in one house and share income and expenses.

### **Adult Family Members:**

All related and non-related people who are 21 years of age and older living in your house.

### **Financially Independent:**

A person is financially independent and a separate economic unit/household when his or her earnings and expenses are not shared by the family/household.

### **Gross Income:**

Is money earned or received by each member of your household before deductions. Examples of deductions are federal tax, State tax, and Social Security deductions.

### *Examples of gross income are:*

- Wages, salaries, tips, commissions, or income from self-employment
- Net farm income
- Pensions, annuities, or other retirement income including Social Security retirement benefits
- Unemployment compensation
- Welfare payments (does not include value of food stamps)
- Public Assistance payments
- Adoption assistance
- Strike benefits
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI) or Social Security Survivor's Benefits
- Alimony or child support payments
- Disability benefits, including workman's compensation
- Veteran's subsistence benefits
- Interest or dividend income
- Cash withdrawn from savings, investments, trusts, and other resources which would be available to pay for a child's meals
- Other cash income

If you have more than one job, you must list the income from all jobs.

If you receive income from more than one source (wage, alimony, child support, etc.), you must list the income from all sources.

### **Current Income:**

Your income at the present time before deductions. Farmers, self-employed workers, migrant workers, and other seasonal employees may use their income for the past 12 months.

### **Income Exclusions:**

The value of any child care provided or arranged, or any amount received as payment for such child care or reimbursement for costs incurred for such care under the Child Care Development (Block Grant) Fund should not be considered as income for this program.

## Letter from the Principal

I am hoping that everyone had an enjoyable and restful summer and that student's and staff are energized and ready for a great school year. Our building project is complete, so students will be having classes in some new classrooms including a new technology room. Students will also have access to the new hallway which connects the Middle School wing over to the gymnasium. I'm sure it will take students and staff time to adjust to the physical changes of the building, but the added space will be great to have. The new 7th graders are all set and ready to navigate around the building since their orientation which we held on August 26. I'd like to officially welcome them to the Middle School.

Students will be returning to school with traditional schedules similar to the type of schedules that most adults had when they were in school. Daily, each student has up to 8 classes (44 minutes each) in their schedule, plus a 30 minute lunch period. Students received their schedules by mail in August. If students need adjustments made to their schedule, they can stop in the guidance office on the first day of school to set up an appointment to meet with their counselor.

Some reminders for parents with the start of the school year:

- Each student will receive an agenda book on the first day of school.
- Check with your child to make sure homework is completed each evening.
- Please look at your children before leaving the house for school, to make sure their choice in clothing meets dress code expectations. These are outlined specifically in the handbook.
- Send students to school with notes. To ensure that students have accurate attendance records, they need to bring a note to school when they are late or absent and they need to bring a note to school if they plan on leaving school early. These notes must be written and signed by parents and must have a reason for why they are late or leaving early. If a reason is not included in the note, students will be marked with an illegal absence.

The first day of school is on September 8 and students need to be in their first period class by 8:00 a.m. If you have any questions, do not hesitate to contact me. I am looking forward to another great year of partnering with parents and community members in supporting the education of our students. Welcome back students and staff!

### COLLEGE INFORMATION

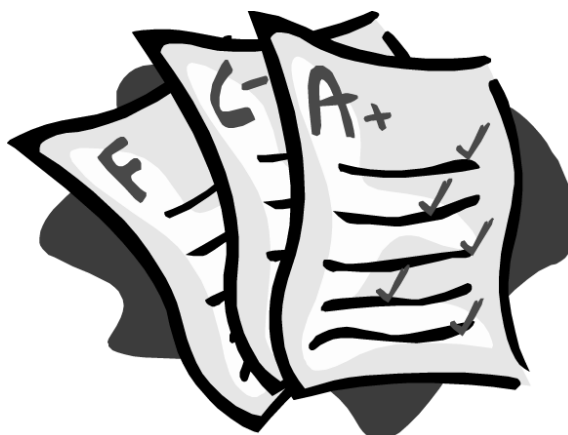
