# **Bus vote set for February 4**

The Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District invites residents to vote on two propositions related to the purchase of new school buses. Voting will be held from noon-8 p.m. Tuesday, February 4 in the front lobby of GMU.

Residents must present identification to vote on the purchase, which will not increase the school tax levy. The propositions are as follows:



#### **Proposition 1: Bus Purchase**

Shall the following resolution be adopted, to-wit: RESOLVED, shall the Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District, Otsego County, New York, be authorized to purchase one 66-passenger school bus and to expend therefore a maximum estimated cost not to exceed one-hundred and twenty-six thousand dollars (\$126,000), including incidental expenses in connection therewith, and a 7-passenger vehicle to expend therefore a maximum estimated cost not to exceed thirty-four thousand dollars (\$34,000), and that one-hundred and sixty thousand dollars (\$160,000) Capital Reserve Fund monies shall be used to pay the cost thereof.

#### **Proposition 2: Establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund**

Shall the following resolution be adopted, to-wit: RESOLVED, shall the Board of Education of the Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District be authorized to establish a capital reserve fund pursuant to Section 3651 of the Education Law to be designated "Vehicle and Equipment Reserve Fund" in order to pay costs of the purchase of the school transportation vehicles and maintenance equipment, and, in order to accomplish the same, said Board is hereby authorized to establish the ultimate amount of such Reserve Fund not to exceed five-hundred thousand (\$500,000), plus accrued interest and other investment earnings thereon, with a probable term of ten (10) years and, to appropriate annually from the available fund balance and/or other legally available funds of the School District to such Reserve Fund.

# GMU students see Hamilton on Broadway!

Students in Bernadette Delaney's U.S. History and Government class attended the Tony award-winning Broadway show *Hamilton* on December 11! Her class received these highly sought-after tickets as part of a special program that gives students the opportunity to attend a show in New York City.

Mrs. Delaney had applied for this program, sponsored by the Gilder-Lehrman Institute of American History, Rockefeller Foundation and The Hamilton Education Program, a few years ago. Students were tasked to research a topic or person related to Hamilton and/or the birth of the United States; write a poem, monologue, song, rap or script; then perform and record a video of the piece in class.

Aimee Piedmonte's English class, Mark Seigers' audio/video expertise and the Hamilton Online Education Program contributed to the completion of this task, which included the analyzation of primary documents, letters, bios and events. As a result, our students earned a trip to Broadway to attend pre-show student performances, a question-and-answer session with cast members, and a matinee performance at Richard Rodgers Theater. Written and produced by Lin Manuel Miranda, the musical offers a unique and diverse look at the life of Alexander Hamilton.

# How to register for Pre-K and Kindergarten

The Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District is accepting Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten applications for the 2020-2021 school year!

Pre-Kindergarten: Resident children of the District who will be age 4 before December 1, 2020, are eligible to register/ apply for our full-day Pre-K program. Please contact Kristy Carey, Registrar, at 607-783-2207, ext. 103, to provide information for obtaining an application.

All Pre-Kindergarten applications must be returned to the Main Office by noon March 27, 2020. The class size is limited as only 18 students may attend. Therefore, a lottery system is used to determine the class roll if more than 18 applications are received.

Kindergarten: Children who will be age 5 before December 1, 2020, are eligible to register for our Kindergarten class. Registration will be held from noon-4 p.m. Thursday, March 5, 2020. Those who are unable to attend registration day during the hours indicated should call Kristy Carey, Registrar, at 607-783-2207, ext. 103, to arrange an appointment.

# Recycling Challenge underway!

Gilbertsville-Mount Upton is collecting clean, dry plastic film until April 1 as we look to defend our titles during the Otsego County Conservation Association's Plastic Film Recycling Challenge.

We're asking students and community members to bring a variety of recyclable plastic film to school in an effort to keep them out of our region's landfills. Students can give plastic film to their teachers (elementary) or class advisors (middle/high school). Community members can deliver items to the main office.

GMU is accepting the bubble wrap, case overwrap, newspaper sleeves and a variety of plastic bags, all of which are typically only recycled through take-back programs offered by grocery stores and other retailers in the state. Plastic bags include bread, cereal, dry cleaning, grocery, ice, produce, salt, wood pellet and re-closable, such as Ziplocs.

GMU classes will compete against each other to collect the most plastic film, with the winners earning a movie day. GMU also will go head-to-head with other Otsego County school districts to see who can collect the most plastic film per capita.

Last year, our elementary school and MS/ HS students finished first in Otsego County – with 6.78 and 1.88 pounds per capita, respectively – as GMU accounted for 1,821 out of the 4,000 pounds collected during the challenge. Cherry Valley-Springfield, Cooperstown, Morris, Oneonta, Richfield Springs, Unatego and Worcester also competed last year.

### From the Health Office

#### **Adult Vaccinations Protect Children**

State School Health Services and the non-profit Trust for America's Health report that regular vaccinations for adults can help protect children, senior citizens and people with weakened immune systems. However, experts say, few American adults get the recommended immunizations.

The report found that less than one-third of adults in the United States get an annual flu shot and only two-percent are vaccinated against tetanus, diphtheria and whooping cough.

Adults should stay current on their vaccines for many reasons, according to Dr. William Schaffner, chairman of the preventive medicine department at Vanderbilt Medical School in Nashville, Tennessee. Doing so protects adults against many diseases and prevents them from transmitting those diseases to family members, infants and elders, bolstering public health in general.

Getting the Tdap vaccine against whooping cough, diphtheria and tetanus is particularly important.

"Young babies are the most vulnerable (against whooping cough)," Schaffner said in a Society for women's Health Research news release. "Everyone who will have contact with babies in the home needs to get vaccinated. And it is now recommended that pregnant women who haven't been vaccinated with Tdap should be in the second and third trimesters to protect themselves and their baby.

"If everyone in a family is vaccinated, it confers a cocoon of protection, so we don't bring the virus or bacteria home and expose our youngest family members," he continued. "The more people who are vaccinated, the more protected a community will be." Stronger members of a society can help protect weaker ones by getting the recommended vaccinations, Schaffner said.

"The frail, older and immunocompromised members of society can survive," he said, "but they are apt to have severe outcomes with certain infections and they cannot respond optimally to vaccines."

#### **Cold-Weather Precautions**

Please talk to your child about how to stay warm and safe during cold/extreme weather. Regardless of a student's age, it is important to check your child's outerwear every day. Winter jackets, hats, scarves, boots and an extra pair of dry gloves are recommended to help prevent frostbite and/or illness when cold weather strikes.

Be sure to develop an emergency coldweather plan with your child, too, so he/she knows when to ask for help, where to find safe shelter, how to identify danger signs (body numbness, burning sensation, pain) and what to wear for protection from the elements. This is particularly important for kids who may be early or late to a bus stop, especially if any of their outerwear is cold and/or wet.

#### Is your child sick?

A student with one or more of the following symptoms/illnesses will be sent home from school: Fever, vomiting, diarrhea, chills, sore throat, possible strep throat, bad cold (very runny nose or bad cough), stomach ache not relieved with rest, headache not relieved with prescribed medication, conjunctivitis (pink eye).

For the health of your child, classmates and staff members, sick students should stay home until they are symptom-free for 24 hours. When a doctor makes a diagnosis of strep throat or pink eye, your child must be on antibiotic treatment for at least 24 hours before returning to school.

Thank you for understanding these guidelines. They are meant to serve the best interests of all students and staff.

#### The Flu and Other Contagious Illnesses

This flu season has been an especially serious one with many staff members and students becoming ill, requiring time missed at school. Here is some information to help you determine what to do when illness hits your home.

Flu and other viruses can vary from mild to severe. This becomes dangerous for children of any age who have certain longterm health conditions, including asthma, diabetes or weakened immune systems.

Symptoms to look out for include fever, cough, sore throat, runny/stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills, fatigue, occasional vomiting and occasional diarrhea.

Here's how to protect your family against the flu and other contagious illnesses:

- Stay away from sick people
- Keep family members with flu/viruses separated from others
- Stay at home for at least 24 hours after fever is gone, without taking feverreducing medications
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing, then throw it away
- Regularly wash hands with soap and water
- Avoid touching eyes, nose and mouth to prevent the spread of germs
- Clean and disinfect hard surfaces/objects that may be contaminated with germs

If you or your child is sick, get lots of rest, drink plenty of fluids and talk to your doctor. If flu symptoms develop, call your doctor immediately.

You and/or your child should stay home from work/school to rest and to avoid giving the illness to other children/staff/caregivers. If a fever (100 degrees or higher) is involved, please stay home for at least 24 hours after fever has subsided without the use of feverreducing medicine.

#### February is National Children's Dental Health Month

The Rural Health Education Network of Otsego, Schoharie and Montgomery counties reports that poor oral health can have a detrimental effect on children's quality of life, their performance at school, and their success later in life. Children and adolescents with poor oral health are more likely to experience oral pain and miss school. Cavities are holes in your teeth that form when sugar from sweet foods and drinks mix with plaque, a sticky, clear film that's always on your teeth. They won't go away by themselves and can only be fixed by a dentist. Although tooth decay is largely preventable, it remains the most common chronic disease of children ages 6-11 and adolescents ages 12-19.

The following tips can help your child improve their oral health:

- Brush 2 minutes, 2 times a day with a soft toothbrush
- Eat healthy foods
- Clean between teeth daily
- Visit a dentist regularly
- Drink water and milk
- Replace toothbrushes when bristles are bent/worn out
- Use mouthguards when competing in sports

- Don't chew on hard objects such as pencils, ice or hard candy as these can chip your teeth
- Floss regularly
- Chew sugarless gum to increase saliva to help wash out food particles
- Ask your dentist if sealants might help protect permanent teeth

Remember, kids start losing baby teeth around age 6. Thirty-two permanent teeth

will replace the 20 baby teeth. Adult teeth are stronger as they are meant to last the rest of the person's life.

Heating equipment is involved in **1 in every 7** home fires and **1 in every 5** home fire deaths.



Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet from any heat source like fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators or space heaters.



Keep portable generators **outside**, **away from windows**, and as far **away** from your home as possible.



Install and test carbon monoxide alarms at least once a month.



Plug only **1 heat-producing appliance** (like a space heater) into an electrical outlet at a time.



Have a qualified professional clean and inspect your chimney and vents **every year.** 



Store cooled ashes in a tightly covered metal container, and keep it **outside at least 10 feet** from your home and any nearby buildings.
