Child Find Notice

The Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District recognizes its responsibility to provide a free and appropriate public education to eligible students with disabilities within its geographical boundaries. The District has a "child find" process that is designed to locate, identify and evaluate children with disabilities residing within its geographical boundaries, preschool through grade 12 or through age 21 if they have not received a high school diploma.

If you know a child who lives within the boundaries of the Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District and attends school in the District who may be in need of special education and/or related services, please contact the District's Director of Special Education for further information regarding the referral and evaluation process. If the student is a school-age student who attends a non-public private school that is not located within the geographical boundaries of the School District, the student may need to be referred to the school district in which the non-public school is located in order to receive services during the regular school year. Please contact that school district for information regarding time deadlines for requests for services.

The District's Child Find process extends to students with physical or mental impairments that substantially limit a major life activity. Such students may be eligible for services or accommodations pursuant to Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act. Section 504 is a Federal civil rights statute that prohibits discrimination against persons with disabilities and programs receiving Federal financial assistance. Please contact your child's building principal for more information regarding Section 504 eligibility and services.

Bus vote set for February 7



Please join us February 7 to vote on two propositions related to the purchase of new school buses, which will not increase the school tax levy. Voting will take place from noon-8 p.m. February 7 at the Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District.

Please note that residents must present identification to vote on the following propositions:

Proposition 1: Bus Purchase

Shall the following resolution be adopted, to-wit: RESOLVED, shall the Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District, Otsego County, New York, be authorized to purchase two 66- passenger school buses and to expend therefore a maximum estimated cost not to exceed three hundred twenty five thousand, two hundred dollars (\$325,200), including incidental expenses in connection therewith, and that \$325,200 Capital Reserve Fund monies shall be used to pay the cost thereof?

Proposition 2: Establishment of Capital Reserve Fund

Shall the following resolution be adopted, to-wit: RESOLVED, shall the Board of Education of the Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District be authorized to establish a Capital Reserve Fund pursuant to Section 3651 of the Education Law to be designated "Vehicle and Equipment Reserve Fund" in order to pay costs of the purchase of the school transportation vehicles and maintenance equipment, and, in order to accomplish the same, said Board is hereby authorized to establish the ultimate amount of such Reserve Fund not to exceed \$750,000, plus accrued interest and other investment earnings thereon, with a probable term of ten years and, to appropriate annually from available fund balance and/or other legally available funds of the School District to such Reserve Fund?

Registration open for PK-K students!

The Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District is accepting Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten student registrations for the 2023-2024 school year.

Pre-Kindergarten Registration

District residents with children who will be age 4 before December 1, 2023, can register/apply for our full-day Pre-Kindergarten program. Those who are interested should call Registrar Kristy Carey at 607-783-2207, ext. 103. Mrs. Carey will provide information for obtaining an application. All Pre-Kindergarten applications must be returned to the Main Office by noon March 31, 2023.

Kindergarten Registration

District residents with children who will be age 5 before December 1, 2023, are eligible to register for Kindergarten. Please call Registrar Kristy Carey at 607-783-2207, ext. 103, to arrange an appointment. The following items are required at the time of registration:

- · Child's Birth Certificate
- · Immunization Record
- · Social Security Card
- Three proofs of residency

Note: Students who are already attending our Pre-K program during the current school year do not need to register for Kindergarten.

Committee to assist in Capital Project proposal

Gilbertsville-Mount Upton's Capital Project Facilities Planning Committee held its first meeting December 12 on campus, starting the process of exploring options to keep our facilities in top condition. The 15-member committee will provide insight and feedback to assist in the final Capital Project recommendation to our Board of Education.

Thirteen committee members attended the first meeting, which focused on potential scope items and financial aspects associated with a proposed Capital Project. After the committee selects and prioritizes potential scope items that our community could support, it will present a proposal to our Board of Education for a possible referendum to be voted on by district residents.

Each has been asked to solicit feedback/input and to report back to the committee, which will meet twice this month.

FERPA Notification

This Notification of Rights under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is intended to advise you of your rights with respect to the school records relating to your student pursuant to the Federal "Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974."

Parents of a student under 18, or a student 18 or older, have a right to inspect and review any and all official records, files, and data directly related to their children or themselves, including all material that is incorporated into each student's cumulative record folder, and intended for school use or to be available to parties outside the school or school system, and specifically including, but not necessarily limited to, identifying data, academic work completed, level of achievement (grades, standardized achievement test scores), attendance data, scores on standardized intelligence, aptitude, and psychological tests, interest inventory results, health data, family background information, teacher or counselor ratings and observations, and verified reports of serious or recurrent behavior patterns.

A parent of a student under age 18 or a student age 18 or older shall make a request for access to that student's school records, in writing, to the Superintendent of Schools, Guidance Counselor or Principal. Upon receipt of such request, arrangements shall be made to provide access to such records within a reasonable period of time, but in any case, not more than forty-five (45) days after the request has been received.

Parents and students are also entitled to an opportunity for a hearing to challenge the content of such records, to insure that they are not inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the privacy or other rights of students, and to provide an opportunity for the correction or deletion of any such inaccurate misleading, or inappropriate data contained therein. Any questions concerning the procedure to be followed in requesting such a hearing should be directed to the Superintendent.

Student records and any material contained therein that is personally identifiable are confidential and may not be released or made available to persons other than parents or students without the written consent of such parents or student. There are a number of exceptions to this rule, such as other school employees and officials, and certain state and federal officials, who have a legitimate educational need for access to such records in the course of their employment.

Students with disabilities shall have the option of deciding whether to disclose the existence of their disability on their high school transcripts.

Website Accessibility Statement

The Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District is committed to ensuring the accessibility of our web content to people with disabilities. We are actively taking steps to ensure our online content conforms to ADA Compliance standards.

We may contact you for further information. The investigation process is typically completed within 15 working days from the date the concern/complaint is received.

Use of student images explained

The Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District features photographs, videos and/or the work of our students in district and community publications on a regular basis. Names sometimes accompany these images, especially for those students who earn special recognition (awards, certificates, honors, etc.) from the district and/or outside entities.

These images may appear in printed district publications (such as brochures, calendars, newsletters, pamphlets, yearbooks, etc.); on the district's website (www.gmucsd.org); on the district's social media pages (Facebook and Twitter); etc.

If you object to your child's image, name or work appearing in these formats, you must submit that objection in writing to the district Superintendent.



Appointments for students enrolled in the SBHC at GMU are available for annual physicals, acute/sick visits, immunizations and more. To make an appointment or to enroll your child, call 607-783-2250. Appointments for enrolled students are also available at other SBHC sites when the SBHC at

GMU is closed. Call 844-255-7242 for more information.

School-Based Health Centers also can provide healthcare on weekdays when school is closed (emergency days/snow days). You can make a telehealth or phone appointment for your child with an SBHC Nurse Practitioner or Physician's Assistant during weekday school closures by calling 844-255-7242 from 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

Please note that the SBHC does not have to be the child's primary healthcare provider as parents/guardians of enrolled students can keep their current provider and use the SBHC as needed. Students must be enrolled with the SBHC to receive healthcare from the SBHC. If school is closed and your child needs emergency treatment, please call 911.

Recycling champs collecting plastic film

Want to help our Recyclin' Raiders win their fourth straight title in the Otsego County Conservation Association's Plastic Film Recycling Challenge?

Gilbertsville-Mount Upton, which won OCCA Challenge crowns in 2019, 2021 and 2022, is again competing against other Otsego County schools to collect the most plastic film per capita. Our students are going head-to-head during an in-school competition, too, as prizes will be awarded to the top elementary and middle/high school grades.

Students can bring recyclable plastic film to their teachers (ES) or class advisors (MS/HS) any day school is in session, from today through April 12. Staff and community members also can bring recyclable plastic film to campus.

Please note that, for health and safety reasons, all plastic film must be clean and dry prior to collection. The following plastic-film items, which can only be recycled through takeback programs offered by New York state grocery stores and retailers, are eligible for collection:

- · Bread bags
- Newspaper sleeves
- Bubble wrap
- Plastic casings/shrink wraps
- Case overwrap
- Produce bags
- Cereal bags
- Salt bags
- Dry cleaning bags
- Wood pellet bags
- Grocery bags
- Ziploc & other re-closeable bags
- Ice bags

Please do not submit any other items as collections with non-recyclable plastic film cannot be accepted. If you have any questions, please email Ashley Hughes at ahughes@gmucsd.org.

GMU ioins First in Math initiative

The Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District has joined the First in Math program for students in grades K-5 during the 2022-2023 school year and beyond.

The New York State Education Department has purchased the First in Math program for all New York students and families, who have access to this resource designed to increase math fluency and support STEM readiness every day through June 2025. This program is free for all NY students, families and school districts.

First in Math gives students an opportunity to build their math skills through practices presented as online games. Every NY school received log-in credentials for all K-5 teachers and students, who work together in classroom teams. Each student also received First in Math accounts so they can practice on their own at any time.

In this unit, students learned about patchwork quilting by creating Freedom Quilts, which were used on the Underground Railroad to covertly convey messages through quilt block patterns. These quilts would be displayed outside of homes or in windows to help enslaved people escape from the South to the North and Canada.

Gilbertsville-Mount Upton was proud to participate in the October 25 unveiling ceremony for the SP4 Richard F. Walton Jr. Memorial Highway at Copes Corners Park.

The ceremony featuring our award-winning band honored former Gilbertsville High School student and Town of Butternuts native Richard Walton Jr., a member of the 326th Medical Battalion, 101 Airborne, American Division, who lost his life in a helicopter crash during the Vietnam War on February 6, 1970.

After completing basic training and medical training in 1968, Walton Jr. volunteered for a one-year tour of duty in Vietnam. Walton Jr. finished his tour as a medic, then volunteered again to return to his work in South Vietnam.

The dedication of the SP4 Richard F. Walton Jr. Memorial Highway—now part of the state highway system constituting State Route 51 within the town of Butternuts—honors Walton Jr.'s life, bravery, dedication and the ultimate sacrifice he made for our country.

Assemblyman Joe Angelino and NYS Senator Peter Oberacker, who sponsored legislation for the memorial highway and signed it into law last October, attended the event.

Assistant Commissioner of the NYS Dept. of Transportation Thomas McIntyre, Town Supervisor of Butternuts Bruce Giuda, Village of Gilbertsville Mayor Nate Talbot, and GMU Principal Heather Wilcox also attended, along with family and friends of Walton.
