### **Superintendent's Message**

#### Budget is a challenge, but we're working on it

Happy spring, Raiders! Hopefully this time of year will continue to bring us warmer weather and sunnier days as we begin developing a budget for the 2024-2025 school year.

Small schools across our region were – without warning – negatively impacted by Governor Hochul's executive proposal in January to remove "Save Harmless" from the school funding formula. Under current law, New York school districts that have calculated



foundation aid at less than what they are currently receiving, usually due to declining enrollment, are held "harmless" and receive aid equivalent to the prior school year. The budget typically has included a minimum increase in past years, too.

This coming school year, GMU stands to lose \$231,000 with the elimination of "Save Harmless" and an additional \$156,000 (minimum increase) for a total foundation aid decrease of \$387,000.

My colleagues and I have been communicating with legislators currently working on the budget with the Governor that an aid cut of that magnitude would cripple small school districts such as ours. Although we hope the legislative budget will reflect less of a reduction in our foundation aid, GMU's Board of Education and I are working hard to find ways to make up for such a loss just in case.

I will present our first run of GMU's 2024-2025 Proposed Budget during our regularly scheduled Board of Education meeting April 16. Balancing our budget has certainly become more challenging over the years, but the Board of Education and I have engaged in many discussions about how we – as a district and a region – can creatively continue to support quality school programs while keeping tax increases at a minimum.

Governor Hochul also is requiring school districts to begin building an electric bus fleet by 2027. My colleagues and I have been talking with legislators about this, too, asking for more time to obtain electric buses. An extension would help as we need to figure out how to cover the high cost of electric buses, whether our power grid can handle the increase in electricity needed to charge buses, how our climate and terrain may impact the efficiency of electric buses, and various other concerns. GMU does not have an electric bus yet, but we will keep you well-informed when we approach these challenges.

On a positive note, the New York State Education Department is reviewing our voter-approved Capital Project to upgrade and enhance the safety and infrastructure of our campus facilities. Upon NYSED's approval, our Capital Project will begin this summer – and we couldn't be more excited!

### **Indigenous Artifacts Find Home At GMU**



A once-discarded artifacts collection related to Indigenous Peoples of New York State has been recovered and now has a permanent home in the Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District.

"The Richmond Artifact Collection" is on display in GMU's Middle School/High School Library and features items used by Indigenous Peoples of NYS throughout history. Organized under the direction of Municipal Historian Leigh C. Eckmair, the collection runs almost the entire length of a wall and is highlighted by a wooden roof, seven display cases, educational documents, and a landscape painting.

The glass-and-wood display cases form a timeline of Indigenous Peoples' artifacts and include mini-scenes to illustrate period-specific activities and customs. Among the artifacts are animal teeth, beads, bones, buttons, ceramics, coins, and stones that were used for building, farming, fishing, hunting and general survival. The types and ages of the objects indicate they originated in the Butternut and Unadilla River Valleys.

Mount Upton native Clyde Richmond (1885-1963) assembled the original collection and donated it in the mid-1900s to Mount Upton Central School, where it was on display for several years. It was discarded, though, when Mount Upton merged with Gilbertsville in the 1980s.



A framed document alongside the main display states the collection "would have been lost had it not been for the vigilance of three maintenance men: Dick Flanders, Bernard Hartwell, and Jim Barney, who brought it to the attention of the school board."

Eckmair then spearheaded a collaborative effort to restore the collection and bring it to GMU, where it will stay to serve and educate the school and the community. Among the dozens of people credited in the project are GMU Superintendent Annette Hammond, GMU Emeritus Superintendent Douglas Exley, GMU Director of Facilities Alan Digsby, 2022 GMU graduate Brynne Livelsberger, NYS Museum Director Mark Schaming, Oneida Nation Historian Jesse Bergevin and David Moyer of Birchwood Archaeological Services.

BOCES Carpentry Teacher Matt White and his students are also credited in the lengthy list of contributors, which includes local artists, collectors, experts, historians and professors, among others. Grants from the Community Foundation of South-Central New York, the Unadilla Valley Historical Society, and Walmart in Oneonta provided financial support.

Students, faculty and staff have the opportunity to see "The Richmond Artifact Collection" every school day. Community members are also welcome to view the collection when school is in session by request. Please call our District Office at 607-783-2207 for more information.


