He has been a great addition to our GMU team and has provided a stronger sense of safety for all of us.

As I write this, our National Honor Society students just hosted our annual Veterans Breakfast on November 9. In addition to serving a terrific breakfast to



more than 50 local veterans and their families, our NHS students also created a ceremony to honor each one. 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#### **Bus Vote set for February 6**

Please join us February 6 to vote on one proposition related to the purchase of new school buses and a van, which will not increase the school tax levy. Bus purchases are aided by NYSED at a rate of 90%. The district anticipates purchasing one 66-passenger bus, one 35-passenger bus, and a van.

Voting will take place from noon-8 p.m. on Tuesday, February 6, 2024, at the Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School District. Please note that residents must present identification to vote on the following proposition: **Proposition 1:** Bus Purchase

Shall the Board of Education be authorized to purchase one (1) 20-48 passenger school bus, one (1) 48-70 passenger school bus, and one (1) van vehicle for the purpose of providing student transportation and ancillary educational purposes, including original equipment and incidental expenses for the foregoing purpose, at a total estimated cost after taking into account state aid not to exceed \$367,096.26; and that such sum or so much thereof as the Board may deem appropriate, in its discretion, shall be paid from the Vehicle and Equipment Reserve Fund to the extent that it is funded?

#### **Junior runner qualifies for states!**

Congratulations to GMU junior *Noah Pain*, who qualified for the State Cross Country Championships with his seventh-place finish at the Section IV Class D Meet on November 2 at Chenango Valley State Park.

*Noah* completed the 5-kilometer course in 18 minutes, 25.30 seconds to secure his berth in states, which was hosted by Vernon-Verona-Sherrill on November 11. The Class D sectional field of 81 boys included *Noah's* Unadilla Valley-GMU teammates *Alex Kemnah* (28, 20:05.40), *Dominic Berthel* (64, 23:42.70) and *Zach Wilson* (74, 26:45.50).

*Noah* went on to finish 65th out of 115 runners in the Class D boys state championship race, completing the 5K course at VVS in 18:58:8.

GMU sophomore *Andrea Favinger* represented UV-GMU in the Section IV Class D girls 5K race and placed ninth out of 64 in 22:17.70.

Additionally, head coach Lee Schaeffer announced 2023 Midstate Athletic Conference awards for UV-GMU. Noah, Alex

and *Andrea* earned MAC First Team All-Star honors, and our boys team received the conference's Sportsmanship Award. Special shout out to *Jake Favinger* for winning the modified boys race at the MAC Championships on October 26 at Unadilla Valley!
