

From Our Health Office

Is your child sick?

A child with one or more of the following COVID-19 symptoms will be sent home from school: fever (temperature greater than 100.0), chills, body aches, cold symptoms (nasal congestion/runny nose, coughing), sore throat, loss of taste or smell, stomachache/ nausea, headache, vomiting or diarrhea.

For the health of your child, classmates and staff members, sick students should stay home from school. Please remember to complete the weekly COVID-19 Screening and monitor your child's temperature daily.

Thank you for understanding these guidelines. They are meant to serve the best interests of all students and staff.

Cold Weather Precautions

Please talk your child about how to stay warm and safe during cold/extreme weather. Regardless of a student's age, it is important to check your child's outerwear daily. Winter jackets, hats, scarves, boots and an extra pair of dry gloves are recommended to help prevent frostbite and/or illness when cold weather strikes.

Be sure to develop an emergency cold weather plan with your child, so he/she knows when to ask for help, where to find safe shelter, how to identify danger signs (body numbness, burning sensation, pain), and what to wear for protection from the elements. This is particularly important for kids who may be early to a bus stop, especially if any of their outerwear is cold and/or wet.

Children's Dental Health

Poor oral health can have a detrimental effect on children's quality of life, their performance at school and their success later in life. Children and adolescents with poor oral health are more likely to experience oral pain and miss school.

Cavities are decayed areas of your teeth that develop into tiny openings or holes. Cavities form when sugar from sweet foods and drinks mix with plaque, a sticky clear film that's always on your teeth. Although tooth decay is largely preventable, it remains the most common chronic disease of children ages 6-11 and adolescents ages 12-19.

The following tips can help you child improve their oral health:

- Brush 2 minutes, 2 times a day (morning and night) with a soft toothbrush
- Eat healthy foods
- Floss between teeth daily
- Visit a dentist regularly
- Drink water
- Replace toothbrushes when bristles are bent/worn out
- Use mouth guards when competing in sports
- Don't chew on hard objects
- Chew sugarless gum to increase saliva to wash out food particles
- Ask your dentist if sealants might help protect permanent teeth

Dr. O'Brien recently completed her MBA from The Isenberg School of Management in Massachusetts and typically will be on site three days a week to provide medical care to GMU students enrolled in the SBHC program. Her appointment makes GMU's in-school facility the first Bassett Healthcare Network SBHC staffed by a doctor.

Dr. O'Brien also graduated from Siena College (1987, BS Biology) and Georgetown University School of Medicine (1996, MD). She completed Pediatric Residency Training at UMDNJ-Robert Wood Johnson in 1999 and became a Certified Physician Executive (CPE) through the American Association of Physician Leadership in 2017.

Dr. O'Brien and her husband of 25 years, Liam, have two sons – Connor and Aidan – and a Standard Poodle named Lucy.

The SBHC is open during school days for well-child visits, immunizations, flu shots and physicals. SBHC staff also can conduct COVID-19 testing for any student enrolled in a school-based health program. Telehealth options are available as well.

Gilbertsville-Mount Upton's Transportation Supervisor closed a 30-year career with the district when he retired January 4, 2021. The 69-year-old Mount Upton graduate said he's not sure what he'll do next,

although spending time in Florida with his wife, Linda, is right at the top of the list.

"Ask me again in three months," said Joe, whose family moved from Deposit to Mount Upton when he was a sixthgrader. "Retirement is a new thing for me."

Transportation was new to Joe at one point, too, as the opportunity to drive buses just sort of popped up. Although active daily on his family's farm, Joe agreed to become a bus driver in January of 1991 at the request of then-Mount Upton superintendent Michael Klockowski.

"He called me and asked if there was any way I could help out because someone was sick and they needed a driver," Joe said of Klockowski, his former basketball coach. "I was going to take a month off and do nothing, but two weeks later, I was on the road."

Six years after that, "they talked me into taking the supervisor job," and the rest is transportation history.

"I had no idea I was going to do this," said Joe, who raised three children (Brian, Jeff, Joanne) with high-school sweetheart Linda along the way. "It went very fast, but it's been a good ride."

Asked what he'll miss the most, Joe didn't hesitate: "The kids. You just get attached to them. You know their car, you know their parents, you know if they're home, you know if they're not home. They're like your own kids."

Pre-K and Kindergarten registration

Gilbertsville-Mount Upton is accepting registrations for students who will attend pre-kindergarten and kindergarten during the 2021-2022 school year.

Pre-Kindergarten Registration

Resident children of Gilbertsville-Mount Upton School District who will be age 4 by December 1, 2021, are eligible to register/apply for the full day Pre-K program. The class size is limited to 18 students; therefore, a lottery system is used to determine the class roll if more than 18 applications are received.

Kindergarten Registration

Resident children of Gilbertsville-Mount Upton School District who will be age 5 on or before December 1, 2021, are eligible to register for the Kindergarten class for the 2021-2022 school year.

'Cutting Edge' mentoring at GMU

Congratulations to Gilbertsville-Mount Upton's Mentoring Program, which was recently highlighted in the CFES Brilliant Pathways Summit.

"In rural schools where mentors can be harder to find ... Heather Wilcox, principal at Gilbertsville-Mount Upton Central School, created a peer mentoring program to ensure consistent meetings.

The newly expanded program at GMU, a partnership between the school and CFES, has Pre-K through 5th graders meeting weekly with mentors in grades 6 through 12. The students learn social and life skills through a series of activities, including a pen pal program with writing prompts and holiday cards.

'It's really about relationships,' says Wilcox. 'It's changing lives.' "

NHS students deliver for GMU families



NHS members Gavin Bonczkowski, Kailah Davis, Emily Hammond, Olivia Held, Dylan McVey, Kyle Meyers, Nicole Meyers, Dalton Proskine and Teddy Sharkey, as well as Leadership students Hannah Bonczkowski, Lane Dibble, Kendra Hammond and Fiona Held, staff and administrators in the GMU Cafeteria on Mondays to package food and school assignments for once-a-week home deliveries.

After loading the packages onto school buses, these students ride along during regular dismissal runs and drop off food and school assignments at designated bus stops. This ensures that children



who attend GMU for in-person instruction and those who are learning remotely receive the food and materials they need to be successful each week.

School bus deliveries also give NHS students community service hours, which have been difficult to find elsewhere because of the ongoing COVID-19 health crisis.

Food packages are automatically delivered to the homes of GMU students who request school meals. All GMU students are eligible to receive free meals this school year. For more information, please call 607-783-2207.

Technology program still going strong

Gilbertsville-Mount Upton students completed a variety of Technology projects last year, packing the shop with such things as a saddle cabinet, rustic coffee tables, walnut cutting boards, foot stools, shaker peg boards, circuit boards, electric motors, problem-solving activities, and more.



Then, COVID-19 changed the world. The 2019-2020 school year closed with months of remote instruction, and school is a lot different in 2020-2021.

Technology teacher Ken Held said the program is still project-based despite the new challenges stemming from the pandemic. "We had to scale back some of the larger projects due to the time constraints and lack of student access to machinery," he said, "but students are still making furniture."

Those enrolled in Furniture class have already built end tables, rustic shelves, antique-style wooden trays, and more. Students recently received a bag full of wood at home to turn into a rustic shelf. Since some lack machinery at home, pieces were precut in the shop. Handsaws were distributed, too, so they could make the final cuts at home. One student, **Kendra Hammond**, even gathered her own pile of cherry to work on with the machines at home.

Middle school students are still hands-on even when they're learning in a virtual setting. Some of the student projects include are foot stools, peg boards and electronics. A few have been scaled back, but technology classes continue nonetheless.

"I see some students thrive in the technology room where they struggle in other courses," Held said. "Technology fills a void as core courses don't always offer a technical-based environment."

Dominic Hartwell, Natalie Gross, Jeff Barnes, Blake SanSoucie, Madison Lockwood and Jenna Carpenter helped prefabricate some parts to make foot stools for 32 students, and hundreds of pieces of lumber have been sent to their homes.

Most students have been online at home for Technology class, doing floor plan drawings, 3-D modeling on computers, and other drawings and activities. "We are making the best of this, trying to still offer a variety of opportunities for students," Held said.

DDP/CAD class enables students to obtain college credit in the drawing class using AutoCAD through Tompkins Cortland Community College. Whether students attend college or not, they will have work-based experience with a program found in many industries. Special thanks to Technology Director Eric Voorhees for creating a link for students to download the CAD program so they can work on it from home!




Shaping the future

The class went old school, using felt shapes and felt boards to craft pictures. Mary credited her sister, a former pre-school teacher, for setting her up with the materials.

Students worked on size discrimination, shapes recognition and following directions during the lesson, which took place in January—the Soaring Eagle characteristic month for creativity.

"We talk a lot about using your imagination with play," Mary said. "It was so quiet as they all worked to figure out what and where to put each shape to copy the picture. They were so proud of their finished products!"







Excellent Eggstronaut Landers!

Thanks to Becky Acla for sharing pics from our November Eggstronaut Landers demonstrations on campus. The egg-drop project challenges students to build devices that will protect an egg when dropped from a high location. But we added a twist, asking kids to build a reusable lander that can survive repeated falls from the same height.

GMU students used the engineering design process to analyze the durability of their projects and improve the design for multiple egg drops. In addition to protecting the egg, successful devices needed to minimize and distribute impact forces when landing.

Testing and observing designs allowed kids to identify weak spots, which could be fixed in future designs. This process of repeatedly designing, building and testing is called iteration and is used by real engineers!







Stacking up on fun!

GMU thanks substitute teachers Meredith Hammond and Darby Champion for taking and sharing pictures of our kindergarten kiddos engaged in a Christmas Tree STEM Stacking Challenge in December.

"I cannot tell you how thankful I am to have such wonderful help," GMU kindergarten teacher Samantha Wise said. "There have been other friendly faces helping us out as well. Without these amazing people, we wouldn't be able to have students engage in all the fun activities that we have planned."





Keep It Clean!

GMU fifth-graders studied the hydrosphere and conservation issues such as plastic, oil and pesticide pollution in December.

Students created land/water models "polluted" by oil, colored vinegar (acid rain), salt (pesticides), and debris (plastics).

Each researched the issues and determined which tools would be best to clean up the hydrosphere. In this science unit, students learned about how to be more responsible because once pollution is in the environment, it can be extremely difficult to clean up!
