2019 Summer School

GMU students who need to attend summer school to make up failed courses or retake Regents exams will be attending the DCMO BOCES campus in Masonville. To qualify for summer school to make up course credit, students must have at least a 55% final average in the course they failed. The grade earned during the school year (25%) will be combined with the summer school grade (75%) to achieve the final grade for the course. Recommendations for summer school will be mailed home this month.

Summer school classes will be held in early July to mid-August. Transportation for Summer School will be provided from GMU to BOCES and from BOCES to GMU. Transportation to and from home will be the responsibility of the student/family. Please call Ms. Parsons in the Guidance Office at 783-2207 if you have questions regarding the summer school program.

K-6 Counselor News from Mrs. Hall

What a busy year it has been here at GMU, with Great Kindness Challenges, NYS testing, Lunch Bunches, Self-Control Surfers, and a year full of memories and friendships!

During the months of May and June I completed my personal safety lessons in grades K-6. I cannot stress how important it is that parents speak with their children about personal safety. Personal safety means taking care of your body and protecting it. We all wear seatbelts and bicycle helmets, but personal safety is more than that. Children need to understand that they have the right to refuse any unwanted touch, even if it's from a trusted family member or close friend.

Children must understand that they can say no and get away, and that they should talk to a grownup about a touch that bothers them. Parents should choose opportunities or 'teachable moments' to reinforce safety skills. If an incident occurs in your community and your child asks you about it, speak frankly but with reassurance. Explain to your children that you want to discuss the safety rules with them so that they will know what to do if they ever face a difficult situation. Make sure your child knows there is always someone who can help. I strongly encourage you to discuss personal safety with your children. Here are some key points to go over with your child:

- 1. Always check first with a parent, guardian, or trusted adult before going anywhere, accepting anything, or getting into a car with anyone.
- 2. Do not go out alone. Always take a friend with when going places or playing outside.

- 3. Say no if someone tries to touch you, or treats you in a way that makes you feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused. Get out of the situation as quickly as possible.
- 4. Tell a parent, guardian, or trusted adult if you feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused.

What should a parent know when talking to a child about safety?

- 1. Don't forget your older children. Children aged 11 to 17 are equally at risk to victimization. At the same time you are giving your older children more freedom, make sure they understand important safety rules as well.
- 2. Speak to your children in manner that is calm and non-threatening. Children do not need to be frightened to get the point across. In fact, fear can thwart the safety message, because fear can be paralyzing to a child.
- 3. Speak openly. Children will be less likely to come to you about issues shrouded in secrecy. If they feel you are comfortable discussing the subject at hand, they may be more forthcoming.
- 4. Teach your children that safety is more important than manners. In other words, it is more important for children to get themselves out of a threatening situation than it is to be polite. They also need to know that it is okay to tell you what happened, and they won't be tattletales.

All of my counseling groups and individual counseling sessions have come to a close. I have had so much fun working with all of my students this year and watching them grow. Have a safe and fun summer. Get outside and play!

GMU led the way in Plastic Film Recycling Project

GMU Elementary and Middle/High School have BOTH been named the winners of Otsego County Conservation Association's Plastic Film Recycling CVontest! Each group had the highest weight collected per capita--6.78 lbs and 1.88 lbs, respectively. Other schools in the competition were Morris, Cherry Valley-Springfield, Cooperstown, Oneonta, Richfield Springs, Unatego, and Worcester. In total, GMU collected 1,821 pounds of the 4,000 pounds collected by all schools.

The results were announced April 13 at the Earth Festival in Milford. Our prize for winning the contest will be a visit from the Zoomobile in June!

New Raiders Robotics Enters RoboRAVE Competition

GMU now has a robotics team. Thirteen elementary and middle school students met through February and March to enter the Robo-RAVE competition in Oxford on April 5th and 6th. This was the first year GMU entered the new competition hosted by Oxford and organized by local resident Mr. Mark Mueller. Dozens of schools entered the competition, including schools from other countries.

Acting members of the GMU robotics team and future technologists included: Brenden Eastman, Skyler Lindroth, Ryan Davis, Madelyne Astolos, Taylor French, Alexia Fergison, Ryan Beismer, Remington Barkman, Cyrus Hall, Alexis Davis, Brandon Kendall, and manager Abigail Davis. Lindroth, Astolos, French, and Barkman should be noted as being excellent programmers during the competition. Cyrus Hall attempted to program and run his own personal robot.

The Raiders learned how to assemble the robots and spent many hours in the programming department, developing code to enable the robot to meander through a difficult course.

Club advisor Mr. Held said, "The programming was difficult for all of us to learn. There were many hours of trial and error. We were somewhat discouraged on the Friday of the event, having only completed a small section of the course. Then Saturday morning of the event came and our robot stopped working."

The Raiders had to use a spare robot and combine parts of the original after the loss of the initial robot and the additional loss of all of the completed programming. Local parent and programmer by



trade, Tom Hall, stepped in to help the Raiders start from scratch on Saturday morning. Students spent much of the morning typing in new code and testing the new robot. The Raiders were finally ready to have their robot judged almost nearing the deadline of the competition.

The initial scorings and timings put the GMU robot into first place out of twenty four teams. However, the Raiders were at a disadvantage. They were unable to attempt more judged timings due to the delay in having to rebuild the robot. The Raiders finished in twelfth place with a very close point differential to the leading robots.

Twelfth place was a high enough placement to put the Raiders into the playoff rounds. However, the robot had acquired a few slight malfunctions and was unable to advance to the final rounds of the playoffs.

"The students worked so hard at the competition and really rose to the occasion. Finishing in twelfth place out of twenty three teams and making the playoffs was a feat in itself," Mr. Held said.

In addition to robotics, students met students from other countries and traded wristbands with the other team members as well. On the Friday of the event, students were offered a buffet of food and danced to music provided by a DJ after the preliminary tests of the robot.

Sensory Path is a permanent installation

GMU Occupational Therapist Jaime Sherwood (right) and Special Education teacher Melissa VanVorce recently installed the permanent Sensory Path behind the balcony seating above the gymnasium. The path replaces a temporary one that was installed and tested last fall.

Sherwood said the path includes sensory-based movements such as crossing midline, jumping and pushing for proprioception (perception or awareness of the position and movement of the body), and a weighted ball for heavy work. The walkway ends with deep breathing.

"These items all encourage the brain and body to work together to better function in the classroom. Students will be brought to this area by a trained staff member who can help them maneuver the areas and focus on readying their bodies to learn," Sherwood said. "I thank the special education teachers from K-8 for helping me develop this walkway.

"We are all so excited for our students to have a place where they can get movement in during their school day!"
